Yewande is an engineer with experience in design, construction and delivery of innovative systems in the built environment. Her work spans projects in the UK, Africa, the Middle East and East Asia. Yewande is currently EMEA Technical Director at CBRE and Vice President of the Institution of Engineering & Technology, where she also chairs its Knowledge Services & Solutions board. She has been named one of the 100 Most Influential Engineers in Europe by the Financial Times and Inclusive Boards and the UK Young Woman Engineer of the Year by the Institution of Engineering & Technology.



Yewande is a non-executive director at Co-Creation Hub, Africa's leading innovation enabler, and at Midlands Mindforge, supporting university spinouts in the UK. She is a Visiting Professor at the University of Westminster, sits on the governing body at the University of Warwick, and serves on Warwick Business School's Global Advisory Board. A passionate advocate for STEM, she presents engineering programmes for television and was awarded an MBE in 2020 for services to engineering innovation and diversity.




Simon Warburton | Chief Technical Officer, Autocraft Solutions Group
